The virus brought the good and the bad within the people in equal measure. There were many examples of residents from our member apartments jumping in to volunteer on various initiatives, be it forming resident task-forces to support people in quarantine to painting social-distancing marks at neighborhood stores to helping farmers clear stock though direct-selling fairs at their apartments. And then there were instances of some RWAs angering not-so-happy residents with some trigger-happy rules and regulations spawning endless debates on social-media on liberty, power, authoritarianism etc. My favorite one is the clockwise/anti-clockwise walking rule imposed by some RWAs.

The pandemic provided an opportunity for the citizens to collaborate with the city's administrators as peers and partners rather than as adversaries or service-providers. We have worked with some very smart and professional officers from the BBMP, City Police, Dept. of Health – this pandemic has given them an opportunity to reach out, seek inputs, put together innovative solutions and keep the citizens afloat in battling the virus. The battle has only started, as it appears with increase number of infections in our city, but the silver lining has been a new momentum to the sarkara seeking collaboration of citizen-groups and RWAs – it appears that there is opportunity within the pandemic to usher in a new normal in collaborative governance, and this is a new normal that we should like!

The lockdowns have also done a world of good to the environment of our city – lakes got a refresh, the air got some respite, the trees enjoyed the summer showers and the birds and strays moved around with an earlier unknown abandon.

As life normalizes to live with lockdowns and unclockdowns, will these 4-months turn the page on the history of Bengaluru? Only time will tell.
